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2019 GENERAL MEETING: 15 OCTOBER 2019

The guest speaker was Greg Grammer, the new City Manager for the city of Rolling Hills Estates. Greg has worked for the City of Rolling Hills Estates (RHE) for 19 years and he became City Manager upon the retirement of Doug Prichard in 2019.

Greg explained the recent RHE reorganization: Alexa Davis is now the Assistant City Manager. Levi Sinclair is a new employee in charge of Community Outreach. Cynthia Morquecho and Daniel A-Haja take on most of the Community Services work that Andy Clark, now retired, used to do. Greg summarized a number of current City projects. The City plans to put some FAQ videos on the website and social media. Public safety is the largest item in the city budget. The city is expanding the automatic license plate reader program. It also is working on emergency preparedness, including a joint plan with the city of RPV and Expo held on Oct 27, 2019 at the Norris Pavilion. Target will be moving into Peninsula Center in January. Old Navy already has opened. Street resurfacing is in progress on PV Drive North, and storm drain repairs are under way. Greg touched on the Cal Water project as well. NEWS BITS FROM DOUG

The Butcher-Solana Project (City of Torrance)

The "Butcher-Solana" 248-unit residential development project planned for the southwest corner of Via Valmonte and Hawthorne in the City of Torrance remains on indefinite hold with the Torrance Planning Department. Approximately 700 responses to a request for comments on the project's draft environmental impact report caused the developer to request the pause. The numerous responses from impacted homeowners and cities (including the City of Rolling Hills Estates) are being addressed by the developer.

The RHOA provided a comment letter regarding this project's likely adverse impact on our community through increased traffic congestion and degradation of the local environment. We will continue to monitor this project and keep the Rollingwood community informed of its progress and actions we plan to take to protect our neighborhood.

View Preservation and Restoration

The City of Rolling Hills Estates established Municipal Code 661 (Chapter 17.55 under "Zoning") to address the issue of view preservation. In its introduction, the code section states: "Both views and trees/ vegetation contribute to the aesthetic value, quality of life, ambiance and economic value of properties within the city."

To help facilitate the balance between the desires of a "view seeker" and a "vegetation owner", MC 661 establishes a five-step process. In the opening section, the code states: "When a dispute arises concerning the impairment or obstruction of a view, the parties should act reasonably to resolve the dispute through friendly communication, thoughtful negotiation, compromise, and other traditional means, such as discussions with the appropriate neighborhood or homeowner association. Those disputes which are not resolved through such means shall follow the procedure established herein."

OF COMMUNITY INTEREST

Important elections are coming up in 2020, and cities on the Peninsula have consolidated their election dates and activities with the County of Los Angeles, including elections on March 3rd that will include the Presidential Primary, Los Angeles County Supervisors, State Representatives, judges, and ballot measures. Voters will be going to the polls in November to vote for President, city council, and other matters. There will be much on which to be educated and informed throughout the year.

One measure that may impact all of us, including many of us with children and grandchildren attending Peninsula Schools, is the School Facilities Improvement Measure that will be on the **March 3, 2020 ballot**. This is **Measure PV**, aimed at the repair of aging Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District sites. Its goals are multiple and include improvement of campus safety/security systems; seismic, roofing, plumbing, electrical, air conditioning, and disabled student access improvements; and updating and replacement of certain bathrooms, classrooms, and science labs that support students for college/career readiness. The question for voters: shall the Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District measure authorizing \$389,385,000 in bonds at legal rates be adopted? (continued next page)

The Palos Verdes Peninsula Unified School District Board unanimously authorized placement of Measure PV on the March ballot. The PVPUSD's 18 schools were constructed at least 60 years ago, and repair and restoration are urgently needed.
