RHE City News Rockbluff Park Playground Equipment

The City of RHE has ordered the new play equipment for Rockbluff park and expects installation by late June. Alexa Davis, the City's Community Services Coordinator, made an interesting and comprehensive presentation to the RHOA's "Let's Chat" virtual event held on March 24. The new play equipment features a slide, climbing wall, three swings, and an improved play surface. Additional seating and other enhancements should be very popular with Rollingwood kids and their parents or grandparents.



Waste Management Residential Organics **Program:**

Waste Management's organics collection program has been operating successfully for several months.

Please use the small, green plastic container (the light green plastic basket delivered to RHE homes by Waste Management in October and November of 2021) to collect your food scraps. Place the scraps in a paper bag in the green waste barrel for collection each Wednesday. The organic waste collected includes food scraps such as Produce, Meat, Dairy, Bakery, and Food-Soiled Paper. The waste must be placed in a separate paper (not plastic) bag in the "WM Green Organics Cart," along with the usual grass clippings and yard trimmings. Remember that plastic, glass, metal, and waxed paper are NOT acceptable for the green cart. For more information, please call Waste Management at (800) 774-0222.



Covid-19 statistics for the City of RHE:

Los Angeles County reports that 95% of RHE residents have received one or more Covid-19 vaccination shots through March 21, 2022. Also, as of March 21, there have been 977 Covid-19 cases in RHE and nine deaths.

Residential and Commercial Projects on Hawthorne Blvd. at Via Valmonte:

The City of Torrance Planning Department reports that the two residential/commercial projects located at Via Valmonte and Hawthorne Blvd. remain inactive. The tall silhouette frame and flags for the project on the north side of Via Valmonte have been removed. The RHOA will stay in contact with the City of Torrance to monitor the activity on both projects.

Reminder for dog owners:

Your dog is welcome on City trails, in open spaces, and City Parks but must remain on leash and under full control of the owner. This rule is according to both City of RHE and LA County Codes.

Warren Arata, Community Appearance Updates

We are officially in the Spring season and hopefully into weather that will allow us to gather outside again. We had a promising winter with early storms, but little precipitation in January and February left the snowpack in the Sierra Nevada well short of what is considered normal. Statewide we are only at about 63% of snowpack level bringing the bad news of a 3rd consecutive year of drought.

We will more than likely see more restrictions regarding water use when we enter summer. It's a good idea (more so now than ever) to reassess our water use and ensure we are doing our best to ensure we are not wasting water – and paying more than we should for water. The easiest thing you can do is check for leaks. Running toilets, dripping faucets, leaking hoses – they all seem benign, just a drip now and then, but it does amount to quite a bit when you add it up. For example, a running toilet can waste 3 gallons a minute; this equates to 180 gallons/ hour, 4,320 gallons/ day, and 30,240 gallons/ week. So in a week, a running toilet could fill a small swimming pool.

Water waste can be even more significant when it comes to outside irrigation. Since we are not always outside, these leaks can go undetected for quite some time. Unfortunately, you may only find out when you get your water bill. There are now flow sensors that you can attach to your water meter to detect when water is passing through your meter. It can alert you when small amounts of water have been running for more than a couple of hours. Pair this with a new irrigation controller that can connect to your WIFI and weather forecast, and you have a simple system that can automatically shut off if the forecast calls for rain or high winds. The new controllers and associated equipment have improved technological features and userfriendliness and significantly reduced pricing. Over time, the systems can easily pay for themselves through water savings and the avoided repair costs associated with a damaged or leaking pipe or fixture.

The past year also brought many Rollingwood homeowners into the fold of native and droughttolerant aficionados. Kudos to those who have transitioned away from turf to low water use landscapes. The new landscapes make trekking up some of the steep streets in Rollingwood worth the effort. Great ideas can be had just by walking our neighborhood.

A topic that has come up is synthetic turf and its use in the landscape. We can provide a bullet-points here to provide some important information:

- The City of RHE does not allow synthetic turf within the right of way and any easements. This includes any parkway strip – the space between the back of the curb and the edge of the sidewalk. Rolling Hills Estates' Municipal Code section 17.59.020 A prohibits synthetic turf in this area.
- The City must receive and approve a request from the homeowner to install synthetic turf in street-facing yard landscapes. The submittal is simple and is in place to ensure that a minimum quality product is specified and a qualified installer is used.
- There are good products currently available, the technology has improved, and many types look quite good. The proper installation of synthetic turf requires a minimum base installation. It cannot be installed directly on soil. A poor

installation of even the best material will eventually look bad.

- Costs of synthetic turf will vary with quality; however, you can expect to pay more for properly installed synthetic turf than real turf. Maintenance for the synthetic turf is close to zero. No need for water (except for cleaning) or chemicals. No mowing either.
- Is synthetic turf a good play for kids and dogs? Nothing beats real turf. Some of the lower quality synthetics will stain with pet urine. Synthetic turf also may get very hot in the summer, sometimes so hot that you can't go barefoot.
- Does synthetic turf present a health risk? The research is ongoing. Research the available data and make the call yourself. One concern is that the common infill for synthetic turf is crumb rubber made from scrap tires, which may have adverse health effects.
- Does synthetic turf harm the environment? The available information is in conflict. There is a myriad of information available, much of it a bit biased and some incomplete.

I hope the above has encouraged potential homeowners to think about using artificial turf on their property and to look into it carefully. I believe all residents have received a flier from Cal Water regarding upcoming water use restrictions and penalties for non-compliant water use. Cal Water also provides rebates for high-efficiency toilets, washers, smart irrigation controllers, etc. Looking at upgrading to more efficient equipment? 
Rolling Hills Estates News and Updates
